Time for a round up of choir activities since the beginning of the year. Several events and activities are highlighted below as we continued to entertain many. Once again, we helped to raise funds for a variety of worthy causes and particularly for the Royal National Lifeboat Institute on our visit to Poole.

7th March: Beaconsfield Festival 2025



We had not appeared outside the borough for some time so at the suggestion of former chairman, Derek Mellor, we joined in the Beaconsfield choral festival which highlighted every choir in Buckinghamshire as well as a few interlopers such as us.

Ace reporter Richard Hope-Smith reported "Friends, one being an ambassador for another choir, who were there said that over 1000 singers took part in the festival. They rated our song selection, performance, and appearance first class with our rendition of "Saints" excellent."

10th May: V.E. Day Celebration at Bentley Priory

On a glorious summer's day, the choir entertained the many visitors to the Bentley Priory Museum, which was of course the Headquarters of RAF Fighter Command.





Although there was no fly past on the day of our concert, the country's VE Day celebrations a few days later featured Lancaster Bomber PA474 flying over the museum (and indeed the Chairman's back garden in Hatch End from where this grainy picture was taken).

"Commander" Mike Gibson provides the following fascinating history of this actual aeroplane. "The Avro Lancaster is the most famous and successful RAF Bomber of WW2. It first came into service in October 1941. PA474 is one of only two Lancaster aircraft remaining in airworthy condition out of the 7,377 that were built [the other is in Canada]. It is now part of The Royal Air Force Battle of Britain Memorial Flight which operates out of RAF Coningsbury in Lincolnshire."

1st June: St Anselm's Church, Hatch End

We gave our annual summer concert in further support of the church restoration fund. A very full church audience gave us an enthusiastic reception, and the retiring collection raised over £1,000 towards keeping the walls intact.



We were as usual supported by Father David who gave two superb solos. This year we were delighted to give the opportunity to talented young organist, Ethan Ghosh, to play two solo items on the recently restored magnificent Willis organ. Ethan was playing at Westminster Abbey later in the week so his amazing talent was a joy to hear by everyone at St Anselm's.




21st June: Parkstone Yacht Club
